Break-ins, vehicle theft reported in Central Peoria

PEORIA — A home was burglarized while the residents slept early Saturday in a Central Peoria neighborhood where a vehicle break-in and sport utility vehicle theft also were reported.

Residents of a home in the 11200 block of West Purtscher Drive told police someone entered their home through a locked but unlatched door and grabbed a purse and phone from a kitchen counter.

A phone that was inside the purse was found in a neighbor's yard, but credit cards, a small amount of cash and the second phone were not recovered.

A vehicle in the 100 block of West Westwood Drive also was burglarized in the same time frame. A window was smashed, and a deposit bag with two checks was taken.

A resident in a location between those two addresses also reported a vehicle stolen. The SUV was unlocked and parked in the driveway of a home in the 1100 block of West Northcrest Avenue when it was taken just before 9 a.m. Saturday.

Man says he was stabbed at Peoria house party

PEORIA — A 34-year-old man was stabbed early Saturday but provided little information to police about the incident that led to the injury.

The victim arrived at the OSF Saint Francis Medical Center emergency room about 1 a.m. with a stab wound to his left side, according to a report.

The victim said he had been at a house party near Arcadia and California avenues when he was attacked. He didn't provide additional details.

Police were unable to locate a crime scene.

Vet says he was attacked by man in ankle bracelet

PEORIA — A man who suffers from mental problems related to a military accident told police he was robbed Thursday afternoon by a man who tried to sell him marijuana earlier in the week.

The 31-year-old victim said he was walking about 2:45 p.m. on Reservoir Boulevard when a male with a parole monitoring bracelet on his ankle and wearing red shoes threatened him.

"I got a gun," the robber told the victim, according to a report on the incident. "Give me all your money, or I'll shoot you."

The victim handed over an undisclosed amount of cash, and the assailant fled into the woods.

The suspect had spoken to the victim in the same area one day earlier and tried to sell him marijuana, the victim said.

Police tentatively identified the suspect but had not made any arrests by Saturday.

Illinois House OKs lower-cost hunting bill

SPRINGFIELD (AP) — A proposal that would lower the cost of fishing and hunting licenses for seniors is moving through the Illinois Legislature.

The House passed a measure on Friday that would lower the cost of licenses by \$1 for those 75 and older who are enrolled in the Benefits Access Program with the Illinois Department on Aging.

ment on Aging.

The proposal eliminates the fee to receive pheasant, furbearer, and habitat or migratory fowl stamps for hunters. For fishermen, the fees for inland trout and salmon stamps are eliminated.

State Rep. Jack Franks, D-Marengo, is sponsoring the legislation that he says will ensure seniors can enjoy the state's outdoors.

The proposal now moves to the Senate for consideration.

The bill is HB4329.

U.S. Senate to take up Illinois judgeship nominee

BENTON (AP) — A nominee for a federal judgeship in southern Illinois has cleared one hurdle toward confirmation.

Democratic Sen. Dick Durbin of Illinois said the Senate Judiciary Committee on which he sits has approved Staci Yandle for a U.S. District Court seat in Benton.

Her nomination now heads to the full Senate for consideration.

Yandle of Carlyle has had her own private practice in O'Fallon since 2007, after having worked at two other law firms for a combined 20 years. She serves on the Illinois Bar Foundation's board and has been an adjunct professor at St. Louis University's law school.

She's a University of Illinois graduate, with a law degree from Vanderbilt University

Illinois wetland project gets federal grant

chicago (AP) — An environmental group is getting a \$50,000 grant to help restore habitat for waterfowl and marsh birds near Hennepin.

The funding for the Putnam County project comes from the Migratory Bird Conservation Commission. The grant was approved March 26 and announced on Friday.

The Wetlands Initiative applied for the grant for the Oak Ridge Wetland Restoration at Hennepin and Hopper lakes. Its project involves restoring 70 acres of wetlands and surrounding savanna and prairie

within the Sue and Wes Dixon Waterfowl Refuge.

Crews will re-establish native wetlands plants to increase nesting and foraging habitat.

Air Force: Illinois air base to lose 99 jobs

MASCOUTAH (AP) — The Air Force said 99 jobs are being phased out in a unit that provides technical services at Scott Air Force Base.

Air Force spokesman Andy Roake said the cuts are expected to take place through 2015.


The jobs include middlelevel management, staff and policy consultation positions.
