Eagle Scout Earns 122 Merit Badges

When Eagle Scout Michael David Whitener of Arnold, Mo., passed Farm Records merit badge last January 22—the day before his 18th birthday—he was extremely happy. According to his records he had earned 122 merit badges, all that were available to him.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Whitener, Mike is a member of Troop 430, chartered to the Junior High School of Arnold. The town is about 15 miles south of St. Louis, Mo., and is part of the St. Louis Area Council.

Michael estimates that he spent 9,000 hours working on merit badges, but he does not think that he missed much because of all this extra work. During seven years in his troop, he held every office in the troop at least once, served under five different Scoutmasters, and never missed a summer camp, spring or fall jamboree.

He attended Philmont Scout Ranch and Explorer Base. Altogether he camped 175 days with his troop and did a lot of hiking and canoeing. He earned the God and Life Protestant Award, the God and Country Baptist Award, seven mile swims, the World Conservation Award, and the Lifeguard BSA. He is a member of Order of the Arrow, Shawnee Lodge No. 51, and is certified as a lifeguard by the Red Cross and in cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

Michael has been on the "A" honor roll all four years of high school and was in the National Honor Society both his junior and senior years. He also has been active in the youth group of his family's church, the First Baptist Church of Arnold, and is considering entering the ministry.

What was the toughest merit badge for him to earn? "Personal Management," he told Boys' Life, "because it was one of the first merit badges I had gotten, and I was young and inexperienced in monetary dealings and financial matters."

The number of merit badges a Scout may earn fluctuates. As of last March 1, there were 118 merit badges on the active list, but by the fall of 1980 the total will go to 120 with the addition of Farm/Ranch Management and Handicapped Awareness merit badges.

Michael has joined the ranks of a very small handful of Scouts who have earned all available merit badges. He thinks his efforts will pay off. "Working with so many subjects really allowed me to broaden my range of possibilities for future employment," he said. "I'll always be able to use the knowledge I have acquired."
